


Once again Balgowlah Boys has produced outstanding NAPLAN results. The following data sets demonstrate the average growth that has occurred with Balgowlah students, from when tested in year 7 to when tested in year 9.

Trend data for Reading Growth over last 5 years




Note, the green line is Balgowlah, the black line is average for all state schools, the red is average for all state government schools.

Trend data for Numeracy Growth over last 5 years




Trend data for Spelling Growth over last 5 years



One might argue that 2016 reflected a downturn from 2015; certainly the graph demonstrates such a trend, however, if you compare the 2016 data to state averages there is still remarkable growth.


There has been much debate as to the significance of NAPLAN testing, we never set our goal to be the best in the state. What this school did engage in is the feedback that can be provided by this type of testing and how we could use this feedback. For instance the following graph shows each student in year 9 represented as an arrow. The colour of the arrow represents if the student produced expected growth (orange is expected growth reached, blue not); the size of the arrow relative to the size of the growth.

Apart from telling us how well the boys have developed at a glance. We can hover over each arrow, identify the student, their actual growth, what competencies they got wrong, the correct response, sample activities to develop their skill or knowledge in that competency. This is the real value in taking this testing seriously – it certainly has and will continue to be an important learning tool at Balgowlah Boys Campus.

Term 3 already and our boys in year 8 have again been setting new benchmarks in all aspects of school life. In Project Penguin last term, teachers from Manly Vale Public constantly commented on the exceptional effort and application our mentors displayed in supporting their students. Special mention goes to our top two mentors, Geoff O'Neil and Sebastian Bland, as well as Lincoln Wood and Max Smith who spoke eloquently on the presentation day at Taronga Zoo. Other schools run this program with year 10 students, so it is so pleasing to see 31 of our boys demonstrating their credentials as future leaders.

Whilst an arduous task, reading all of the year 8 reports was an immensely satisfying experience. The most pleasing aspect was the level of effort our boys are making in class. We used this as the basis for class awards in the "By Effort We Achieve Presentation". In some classes it was such a close competition for the awards that boys with over six "fives" for effort were denied an award. It is an old cliché but never more true that we just can't award enough of our wonderful boys so please know that our pride and congratulations go with all the boys.

Homework club has begun again on Tuesday afternoons. This term we are teaching specific study skills for 10 minutes at each session before we allow the boys to move on to specific tasks for homework, assignments or study. It starts at 3.20 in the library and runs an hour with snacks provided and plenty of help from teachers. Please encourage your son to participate in this valuable opportunity.

Family holidays are important times for bonding and learning experiences beyond the school experience. If you need to remove your son from school during term please ensure that you clearly communicate this to the office in writing as per the DEC policy on student absence.

We will be meeting all the boys in one-on-one interviews, beginning next week. The purpose of this is to give them an opportunity to let us know how they are going and anything they feel would help their success in the future. We will be visiting the boys during ELAN so it will take us many weeks to visit with all 156 boys. As always, if your son or yourself have any concerns there is no need to wait, we always welcome students who want to ask a question, need guidance or seek reassurance.

Whilst it is only term three 2016, plans for the 2017 year 9 camp are underway and we hope to communicate details of this later in the term. We aim to run the camp early in Term 1 2017. Camps can be a difficult expense for families but they are vital in connecting students to peers and school life in general as well as fostering personal growth. If you believe it will be difficult for your family to meet the expense of camp by the end of this year please discretely let us know well in advance and will set up a payment plan from the start of term 4 to allow parents to more comfortably pay off the cost of camp.

On a final note, we have been forming a year 8 committee of around 15-20 boys, representative of all the social groups in our year to assist us in making plans for the year group as a whole. We would dearly love it if we could have a similar representation from parents. This would not be an arduous task, potentially we are asking for about a half hour meeting of parents once a term. 
